HIGHLIGHTS

- Diversified industrial base due to Asia-Pacific gateway
- Growth opportunities in energy, mining & technology
- Canada 2nd weakest economy in OECD, adjusted for population
 - B.C. outperformed other provinces due to mega capital projects
- Challenges ahead
 - Mega projects are completed
 - Per capita GDP declining since 2022 & no recovery expected
 - Fiscal trajectory unsustainable
 - Net outflow of current residents

B.C.'S UNIQUE FEATURES

Demographic

- 5.6m population (2.7m Metro Vancouver)
- 42% foreign-born, 5% temporary residents
- 202/634 of Canada's FNs, majority not under treaty

Geographic

- Larger than UK & Ireland, Japan, California
- 25,700km coastline, 40,000 islands
- 75% mountains, 64% forests, 5% arable
- 95% Crown land, 5% private land


Ecological

- 1,037 provincial parks, 7 national parks



VISUALISING THE \$US 105 TRILLION WORLD ECONOMY IN ONE CHART






Canada is 2.0% of the world GDP

B.C. is 14% of Canada, so 0.3% of world GDP




B.C. RANKS 48TH/60 CANADIAN PROVINCES & U.S. STATES

Labour productivity, business sector, by industry, 2023, B.C.




Real GDP (\$) per hour worked

Total labour compensation per hour worked, business sector, by industry, 2023, B.C.



Merchandise exports, by destination, 2023, B.C.




HIGHEST POPULATION GROWTH RATE SINCE 1957-58



NET INTERNATIONAL MIGRATION AS A SHARE OF POPULATION IS 6X POST-WW2 AVERAGE




Net international migration as a share of Canadian population, quarterly data




CANADA IS SECOND WEAKEST ECONOMY IN OECD

Total growth in real GDP per capita, USD PPP-adjusted, 2018-2023




B.C.'S GROWTH HISTORICALLY WEAK, BUT BEST IN CANADA DUE TO MEGA PROJECTS

B.C. INCOMES NOT EXPECTED TO RECOVER PRE-PANDEMIC TREND




B.C.'S <u>PRIVATE</u> SECTOR JOB GROWTH LAGS REST OF CANADA






B.C.'S <u>PUBLIC</u> SECTOR JOB GROWTH LEADS REST OF CANADA

Public sector employees, indexed Q2 2019=100






FEW SECTORS HAVE SEEN PRIVATE SECTOR JOB GROWTH SINCE 2019






B.C. JOB GROWTH WEAK EXCEPT VANCOUVER ISLAND AND PUBLIC SECTOR

Average annual employment growth 2019-2024*, %












B.C. RUNNING CANADA'S LARGEST OPERATING DEFICIT






TAXPAYER-SUPPORTED CAPITAL SPENDING RISES TO \$14B

THREE B.C. CREDIT RATING DOWNGRADES IN THREE YEARS






DEBT SERVICING SURGES UNDER B.C.'S FISCAL PLAN AND EVEN HIGHER AFTER Q1 UPDATE

VERY LITTLE GROWTH IN NUMBER OF PRIVATE SECTOR EMPLOYEES






NUMBER OF PUBLIC SECTOR EMPLOYEES HAS SURGED 30% HIGHER SINCE 2019







B.C. non-residential building permits, millions \$ constant






B.C. HOUSING STARTS SAME AS 2019 AND Q3 FIGURES POINT TO FURTHER DECLINES






HOUSING STARTS ARE RUNNING <u>BELOW</u> 2019 LEVELS IN MB, BC AND QC
